“*Love is to will “good” to others.*” I recently heard a Renovare conference speaker named Dallas Willard give this definition. It has stimulated a lot of thought for me. There is much I like about it. Here are a couple of my thoughts.

First, I like the fact that the “will” is set front and center in this definition. Love, of course, is more than the above quote. (*It is patience, and kindness, and not arrogance. It is about hope, and belief. It is a “mouth-full.”*) But I like placing the “will” front and center for a moment to accent the point that as Paul says that “*love does not seek its own way*” this takes some conscious thought and deciding on our part. I can’t simply sit back till I “feel” something before I act. In fact, I believe that “feeling” is a result of love, not love itself.

So, have you decided today to love? Have you set your mind to it? Don’t wait for the feeling. Go for it.

Secondly, the above definition gives arrow heads to a sometimes dull line. It gives me pointed direction when encountering not only family and friends but also mere acquaintances or even strangers. I can at the least, and I do this often now, pray for people as I encounter them. “*Lord,*” I pray, “*let Your goodness flow upon this person today.*” And I can do more than pray. I must. I can look for ways to actively seek “good” for those around me. This, after all, is a very important part of loving others. So try it out. Pray for strangers. Act on the behalf of others.

Love is “goodness” on the move. Move with it.

Lastly, the above definition made me wonder what it would mean when directed towards God? Deuteronomy 6:5 tells us to, “*Love the Lord your God with all your heart...*” What kind of sense does it make to “will ‘good’ to God” when God lacks no goodness? No love I give to Him can add any goodness to His Being. So what might it mean?

Here is what I came up with. I realized that if love is to “will good to another.” And if the word “good” is a general term meaning “how something should be.”

Matt's Musings: Depositing Hope

And you also were included in Christ when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation. Having believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit, who is a deposit guaranteeing our inheritance until the redemption of those who are God's possession—to the praise of his glory. ~ Ephesians 1:13-14

Inheritances are interesting when you begin to think about them. I may one day receive an inheritance from my parents, but I have not yet taken possession of it. The things that make up my future inheritance (my parents' house, cars, family heirlooms, money, and other assets) already exist tangibly, but right now they are in the possession of my parents. So while the inheritance exists and currently has a certain value, it is not yet mine and I do not currently have the responsibility or authority to do anything with those assets.

In his life, death, and resurrection Jesus Christ has secured for God's children a marvelous inheritance. As God's children, we can look forward to the day when there will be no more pain, no more tears, no more sin, a day when God will make all things right. What a great day that will be. However, it is an inheritance, which means that the fullness of what Jesus Christ has secured and holds in his possession is still a future event for us. At this time, we have not yet taken full possession of our inheritance.

This scripture passage from Ephesians tells us that God has sent his Spirit to his Church in order to be a deposit that will guarantee the future inheritance awaiting us. Deposits are always glimpses of the final payment. When you make a deposit of earnest money when buying a home, you make that deposit in dollars. We don't make a deposit in rubles or coffee beans, because that is not the means by which the rest of the payments will be received. God's deposit is the same way. His Spirit is given to show the world and us a glimpse of the future inheritance and to give people an inkling of the full inheritance that is to come.

When people see these glimpses as the church lives out its faith given to us by God's Spirit through discipleship, worship, hospitality, fellowship, and mission, they are given hope that the future will indeed be different than the way things are now. This is the mission of the church: to leave deposits of hope wherever we are and wherever we go. This call is both individual and communal. We are called to leave a deposit where we work, where we go to school, and in our families. But we are also called to work together to offer hope to the surrounding High Pointe neighborhood, to Cedar Hill, to North Texas, and perhaps even farther.

As I begin my new role as the Director of Youth and Ministry Development, the above is an outline of my thought process regarding our church and its ministry. I hope to highlight some of the ways that we are leaving deposits of hope through our church's ministry. One such example is on page 4 as our youth mission trip is featured in a local Arkansas newspaper.

The church is the community of the "called-out ones" who know, follow, and serve Jesus Christ in all that we do in order that we may offer hope to a broken, hurting, and sinful world. What exactly that will look like going forward as we develop new ministries, I am not sure. But I do know that we have been given a deposit of the inheritance to come through God's Holy Spirit who will continue to call us to unique ministries. May we together discern how we as a church can offer hope to each other and to our surrounding community. May we truly be **HOPE** Lutheran Church.

Then (realizing if a is b, and b is c, then a is c) loving God is to will what “should be” to God. And what should be? What should be is God is God, and I am not. God is creator. I am creation. God is king. I am servant. All this leads us to what the scriptures say plainly, *“This is love that you keep (his) commandments.”*

All of this thinking does not make loving God easier. But it does make it clearer. And in this world of dull-fogginess and feeling-driven action clarity is no small thing.

So “will ‘good’ to others.” Make up your mind. Pray. Act. And see clearly. And continue to start the cycle over and over with confidence of grace. After all, “God loves us first.” You have a great God pulling for you!

Missions begin at home

Some college friends get together years later to party, but some get together to serve. Not only did college friends Rusty Perkins, Noah Mitchell and Matt Cleaver choose to serve, they brought 55 young people from three different churches along to help.

"What better thing to do to than missions?" Perkins, the youth minister for Peace Lutheran Church, asked, explaining that he had planned to get together with his friends from John Brown University and needed an excuse. His church was the host for the mission trip that included youth from Pea Ridge Baptist Church, where Mitchell is the youth minister, and Hope Lutheran Church in Dallas where Cleaver serves.

Last year, two of the three churches did mission work together. Pea Ridge Baptist and Peace Lutheran combined their youth groups for the week.

When you're doing something like community service, denomination isn't very important, Perkins explained.

"We have so much in common," he said. Some of the members of the two youth groups know each other from school or other activities.

This year Cleaver brought his group for the first time, but he's not sure it will become a tradition.

"I want my kids to see we can do this in our own community," he explained.

One advantage of working in your own community is you can go back and see how your service has helped, Perkins said. Some of his youth returned to the Samaritan Center to volunteer after the group worked there last year.

But even without leaving town, they still have the experience of a mission trip.

"It's like band camp or a sports camp," Cleaver explained. "You focus on it intensely for a week and it makes you better for the rest of the year."

It's also a good bonding experience for each of the youth groups. Community is built when you're not focusing on it, Cleaver said.

The group had different projects every day to focus on. They spent one day helping clear trails at Hobbs State Park. Perkins said his group works at Hobbs every year.

Another day was spent helping Rebuilding Together make emergency repairs on a Rogers home. A member of the congregation put Perkins in touch with Rebuilding Together.

One day was spent clearing ice storm debris in the yard of a 93-year-old resident that a member of the church told them about and on another day they returned to the Samaritan Center.

For 15 year old Dakota Woodward, a member of the Pea Ridge group, spending a week working with his youth group is just as much fun as going to the lake or on vacation. He especially enjoys meeting new people.

Megan Johnson who came from the Dallas area with Cleaver's group said mission week always happens to be the hottest week of the year. They work from 9:30 until 5 with only a half hour for lunch.

But it doesn't seem that long, Matthew Williams of Peace Luther said. "It just blows by."

Williams was surprised to see the need in his own community.

After work, the group returned to the Peace Lutheran building on Bellview Road to eat and enjoy some down time. The local teens went home, but the Dallas group stayed in the church building. There's a television there, Johnson said, but they didn't have much time to watch it.

The theme of the week is "Shalom" which can be translated to mean "wholeness" or the process of making something whole, Cleaver said. The trio of youth ministers hope their groups have helped fix a few things so that the world became a little more whole for some area residents.

Or as Johnson said, "We want to leave little deposits of hope where we go."

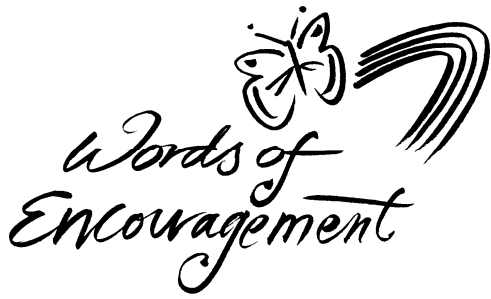



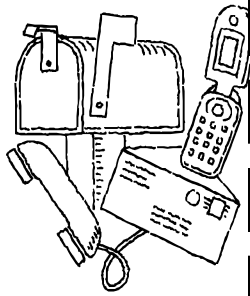
